Last hurdle before Lord's showpiece

And then there were four. Hampshire, Warwickshire, Gloucestershire and Lancashire are the teams left to scrap it out for a place in the NatWest Trophy Lord's final on August 26.

Gone are the board XIs, Holland, Denmark and all the minor counties that make this competition so different and special. Now it's down to business as the cream of the crop battle it out.

Last year's winners Gloucestershire are aiming to defend their title against 1998 champions Lancashire at Bristol while Warwickshire have home advantage against the tournament's surprise package Hampshire.

Lancashire and Warwickshire have the best previous records in this competition, with six and five wins respectively. The Lancastrians' demolition of a strong Surrey side in their quarter-final at the Oval was impressive but many people's favourites are their semi-final opponents Gloucestershire, whose one-day form over the last two seasons has been awesome.

Mark Alleyne's men claimed two one-day trophies last year and they have already captured one silver pot this season and will be aiming to make it a second double on the trot.

Warwickshire's roller-coaster form continues on an upward curve in the NatWest Trophy as Neil Smith's side prepare for the most important game of their season.

With little chance of silverware in either league competition, the prize of a NatWest Trophy final offers a chance of glory in an otherwise nondescript season for the men from Birmingham.

Likewise with Hampshire, who have plumbed the depths in all competitions this year.

Definitely the surprise semi-finalists considering their form in both the four-day and one-day game, Hampshire pulled off an excellent win over Middlesex in the Lord's quarter-final to ignite their season.

A return to the home of cricket in the final would certainly appease worries from fans who expected great things after the county signed Alan Mullally and Shane Warne.

Flintoff's firepower sees off Surrey

Andrew Flintoff underlined his desire to succeed at the highest level by powering Lancashire to an emphatic NatWest Trophy quarter-final victory over Surrey.

The 22-year-old delivered when the pressure was really on, scoring an unbeaten 135 to ensure an eight-wicket triumph with 14 overs to spare.

Chasing Surrey's 210 for seven, Lancashire's victory was by no means assured on a turning wicket when Flintoff walked out to bat after Alex Tudor had flattened Michael Atherton's off-stump from the third ball of the innings.

Flintoff treated former international bowlers like Alex Tudor, Ian Salisbury and the Hollioake brothers as little more than cannon-fodder and by the time captain John Crawley hit the winning runs, Flintoff had hit four sixes and 19 other boundaries in his 110-ball innings.

Even as proven a player as Sourav Ganguly, who had not faced a ball when Flintoff arrived at the crease, was forced into a lower role and contributed just 51 runs to a 190-

run partnership which lasted 186 balls.

By the time Ganguly fell, edging Tudor to Graham Thorpe at slip after reaching his half-century off the previous delivery, Lancashire needed only 21 runs for victory.

Flintoff's performance was all the more impressive considering Surrey had earlier struggled on a pitch suited to turn with all seven of their wickets falling to Schofield, Gary Yates and Gary Keedy.

Stewart hammered a brisk 49 including a six off left-arm spinner Keedy and six other boundaries during a promising

opening stand of 80 with Ian Ward spanning just 19 overs.

Once Stewart departed, playing onto his stumps attempting a front-foot drive off Keedy, the innings capitulated with leg-spinner Schofield finishing with four for 41 while off-spinner Yates claimed two for 40.

Surrey lost all seven wickets for just 102 runs in 26 overs, including a burst of four wickets for 40 runs in 11 overs after captain Adam Hollioake had decided to bat first to allow spinners Saqlain Mushtaq and Ian Salisbury to bowl last.

Tim Hancock's first one-day century kept Gloucestershire on course for their fourth successive Lord's final as the NatWest trophy holders reached the last four again with a 62-run win over Northamptonshire.

Hancock's effort was the cornerstone of the hosts' 280 for eight at Bristol, where the pressure of the run chase told as Northamptonshire subsided to 218 for nine.

Playing his first NatWest match of the season, Hancock (110) figured in a century second wicket stand with veteran Kim Barnett (51), having already put 69 on the board without loss in company with Dominic Hewson (38). Gloucestershire always looked set for a big total after captain Mark Alleyne had completed the important matter of winning the toss and deciding to bat on a sunny morning.

When Hewson departed after 16 overs, caught behind cutting at Strong, the stage was set ideally for Barnett returning after a knee injury to play an important hand.

He did so with a workmanlike half-century in a 121-run stand with Hancock that took up just 22 overs. Barnett did not find the boundaries with the frequency of his partner, hitting just two fours.

But he did continue to chip into the infield gaps and run well a formula which had al-

ready paid handsome dividends for Hancock and Hewson.

A glittering century from one-day specialist Nick Knight secured Warwickshire a NatWest Trophy semi-final place in convincing style at Edgbaston.

The left-handed opener plundered 118 as Warwickshire eased to victory by 81 runs against Glamorgan.

Knight's 11th career one-day hundred set up an imposing 273 for seven, Knight sharing in a stand of 123 with Dominic Ostler (63) for the third wicket.

In reply, a clutter of mid-innings dismissals all but sealed Glamorgan's fate as home captain Neil Smith returned three for 37.

By the time Smith had bowled opposite number Matthew Maynard for 36 to reduce the visitors to 130 for six, Glamorgan had lost the heart of their order and all hope of saving the tie.

Hampshire kept their season alive at Lord's with a comfortable NatWest Trophy quarter-final victory over Middlesex to maintain their expensively-assembled side's pursuit of silverware.

With expectations high after the signings of Alan Mullally and Australian legend Shane Warne, Hampshire's season has stuttered alarmingly on all fronts.

But despite some woeful performances this season, Robin Smith's side gelled into a competitive unit in the skipper's absence to brush Middlesex aside.

All-rounder Dimitri Mascarenhas claimed a career-best four for 25 (and a man-of-the-match award to boot) in helping dismiss the home side for a lowly 127 in just 44 overs.

Hampshire frustrated Middlesex's attack with a 50-run opening stand and despite the loss of three wickets in nine overs they cruised to a seven-wicket victory with 15.1 overs to spare to become the first side into the semi-finals.

Warwickshire v Hampshire



Preview – Saturday 12th August (Live on Channel 4)

DESPITE the signings of Shane Warne and Allan Mullally, Hampshire now have just one chance of silverware this season.

And colourful Aussie Warne will be on international duty against South Africa - no doubt hoping his county colleagues can save something from the disappointing campaign.

But despite languishing near the bottom of the tables in both the National league and County Championship, the NatWest Trophy has seen some of Hampshire's best form with big victories over Middlesex and Durham.

And virtually unknown Londoner Dimitri Mascarenhas has put the stars in the shade to help Hampshire through to the semi-final. The 23-year-old hit 67 runs in the eight wicket victory against Kent County Board and then took four wickets against Middlesex to help his team to a seven wicket win in the last round.

Players to watch

- Since moving to Warwickshire in 1995 Nick Knight has become known as a one-day specialist. Back-to-back centuries for England in the 1996 Texaco series matches against Pakistan highlighted the left-handed batsman as a special talent. But, although his international career has been patchy since, he is showing good form this season with an average of 81.20 in the County Championship and 59.5 in the NatWest Trophy
- Dimitri Mascarenhas. The 22-year-old Londoner has emerged as a possible saviour of Hampshire's season with his blistering form in the NatWest Trophy. Although he has not impressed in other competitions, the all-rounder has used his skills with bat and ball to earn victories against Kent CB (67 runs) and Middlesex (four wickets). In 30 overs in the competition he has claimed nine wickets for just 63 runs, while he is averaging 69 with the bat.

In between Durham were beaten by five wickets after the Hampshire attack dismissed the home side for 91.

Meanwhile Warwickshire are still competing on all fronts and have made comfortable progress to the semi-final after an early scare against Essex CB.

That tight eleven-run victory was followed by a 40-run win against Derbyshire and an 81-run win against Glamorgan. The last two victories were thanks to centuries by Ashley Giles and Nick Knight.

Giles' first one-day century - 107 off 97 balls - took Warwickshire to a commanding 257 for 8, before Derbyshire were dismissed for 217.

And Knight's 118 contributed to a total of 273-7 in the quarter final, with Glamorgan only reaching 192 in reply.

Unlike their opponents, Warwickshire will be able to call upon their star overseas player. South African fast bowler Allan Donald has not been released to play against Warne's Australia.

With both teams saving some of their best performances for the one-day competition the semi-final at Edgbaston should be a competitive, high scoring match.

Venue

- Warwickshire's Edgbaston home is a fantastic arena in which to play cricket. Brian Lara, appearing as the home county's overseas players, smashed his incredible innings of 501 here. And as one of six Test venues in the country, it has hosted many memorable matches down the years. The vast Edgbaston terraces can accommodate 17,500 spectators, and a big crowd is expected to fill the ground and create a vibrant atmosphere.

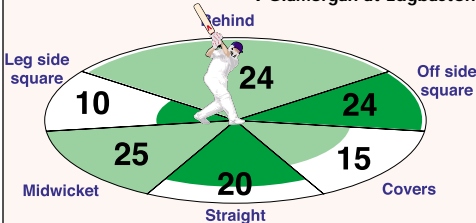

Preview – Sunday 13th August (Live on Channel 4)

THE meeting of the reigning cup holders and the one-day specialists promises to be a mouth-watering affair.

Gloucestershire are continuing their two-year domination of the one-day game and comfortably beat Northamptonshire by 62-runs in the last round, thanks to a maiden one-day century by Tim Hancock.

The opener's 110 took Gloucestershire to a formidable total of 280 - the highest score they have ever recorded batting first at Bristol.

They now stand one game away from the opportunity for back-to-back cup triumphs after last seasons 50-run victory against Somerset at Lords.

But their progress has not been comfortable and they actually lost in the first round to Worcestershire. But Worcestershire had fielded an ineligible player and Gloucestershire won the re-

play by five runs.

And the next round saw another dramatic victory when Gloucestershire claimed five wickets for nine runs in just three overs to beat Leicestershire by 10 runs.

But Gloucestershire will face a stiff test of their credentials when they meet an in-form Lancashire team fresh from an eight-wicket demolition of Surrey.

All-rounder Andy Flintoff rammed home a point to his many critics with an awesome batting performance.

After Lancashire's bowlers had restricted Surrey to 210 for 7 from their 50 overs, Flintoff came to the rescue after Mike Atherton had been dismissed in the first over of the reply.

He bludgeoned 135 runs in a near 200-run partnership with Sourav Ganguly to take Lancashire past their target with 14 overs to spare.

Lancashire are still regarded as one-day specialists and will relish the prospect of challenging the current pretenders to their throne and stop them reaching their fourth one-day final in a row.

Players to watch

● Still regarded by many as the best wicket keeper in England, Jack Russell is Gloucestershire's talisman. He holds the world record for dismissals in a test, but is also a dogged batsman who is difficult to get out. He has averaged just under 30 with the bat in the NatWest trophy and has a highest score of 86. He has now retired from international cricket to concentrate on his county commitments.

● The giant Andy Flintoff is a powerful all-rounder in the Ian Botham mould. He can be devastating with the bat, as demonstrated by his 135 not out against Surrey in the last round which guided his team to an eight wicket win. He is particularly strong off the front foot and his form earned him an England call up in 1998. Although his bowling has tailed off due to back problems he can still be a match-winning one-day performer.

Venue

● Gloucestershire's picturesque 8,000 capacity County Ground is located high above the city of Bristol. The venue has an Edwardian pavilion, and crowds have gathered here to watch first-class cricket for over a century. WG Grace scored a triple century at Bristol in 1896 against Sussex, a feat which was matched by WR Hammond 38 years later against Glamorgan.

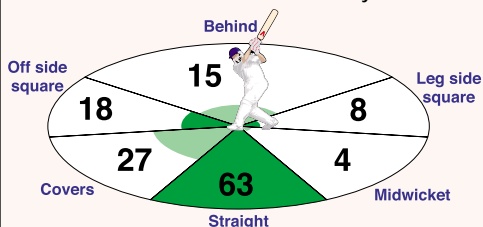

THE DUCKWORTH/LEWIS SYSTEM

All NatWest Trophy matches have a reserve day, but if play is still lost to the weather the Duckworth Lewis system can be used to reset targets. The system is based on what percentage of its resources (overs and wickets) a team have left.

With 50 overs left and 10 wickets remaining, a team has 100 per cent of its resources left. The table shows the percentage of resources at other stages in the innings.

The procedure for working out targets is as follows:

- 1) For each innings: Use the table to calculate the resource percentage lost by the interruption and therefore calculate the resource percentage still available.
- 2) If team 2 have less resources available than team 1, calculate the ratio of the resources available to both teams. Team 2's revised target is obtained by scaling down team 1's score by this ratio.
- 3) If team 2 have more resources available than team 1, calculate the amount by which team 2's resources exceeds team 1's. Work this out as a percentage of 225 (the average 50-over score in ECB matches and one-day internationals). This gives the extra runs to add to team 1's score to give team 2's target.

PLAYING CONDITIONS

- One innings per side of up to 50 overs. A maximum of 10 overs per bowler.
- Scheduled hours of play 11am to 6.45pm. Each innings scheduled to last a maximum three hours and 45 minutes. There will normally be two sessions of play of three hours and 30 minutes each, with an interval from 2.30pm to 3.25pm. The interval will be reduced if necessary.
- Two drinks intervals per innings, but these can be cancelled to make up time lost to interruptions.
- Fielding sides can be penalised for slow over rates by fines and by a reduction of overs in their own innings.
- For the first 15 overs a minimum of seven fielders plus the bowler and wicket-keeper must be inside the fielding circle as the ball is bowled. For the rest of the innings a minimum of four fielders plus the bowler and wicket-keeper must be inside the circle. The restrictions are lifted earlier when the number of overs is reduced.
- In the event of a tie, the team losing fewer wickets will win. If the sides are still level, the higher score after 15 overs will win.
- In rounds one and two, run rate may be used to set a revised target after a suspension of play. From round three onwards, the Duckworth Lewis system will be used.
