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COMMONWEALTH BANK UNDER-19 CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES Strong performances in the Commonwealth Bank Under-19 Championship Series could lead to Australian selection this year for the 2003 international series against England.

England arrives on Australian shores for three four-day matches and five limited-over matches.

Australia last played England at this level in 1999 in the United Kingdom. The young Australians won the one-day series 2-1 but drew the three-Test match series 1-1.

That tour of England featured now established first-class players Michael Clarke (NSW), Sean Clingeleffer (TAS), Nathan Hauritz (QLD) and Paul Rofe (SA).

This summer's series will be held in January and February in Adelaide, Melbourne and Sydney. The Australian team for the series will be announced at the completion of the 2002-03 Commonwealth Bank Under-19 Championship Series.

England's side includes seven first-class players. The 15-man squad, announced in November, arrives in Adelaide on 2 January and will spend time at the Commonwealth Bank Cricket Academy before the first match at St Peter's College on 12 January.

New South Wales prevail in 2001-02 Commonwealth Bank Championship Series

As he races in to unleash another lighteningquick delivery, the expression on Brad Williams' face suggests to any batsman that he'll never let up. That's the strength which underpins the tale of one of Australian cricket's most impressive stories.

Growing up in Frankston, on Victoria's Mornington Peninsula, sport was the lifeblood for the Williams boys. As backyard competition fuelled Brad's passion for the game, his eagerness to follow in the footsteps of his elder brother, Jeff, saw him join his first club, Baxter Cricket Club.

Just as his deliveries are fast, Williams was quick to hone and develop his skills. He progressed through the ranks of club cricket and gained selection in Victoria's under-17 team in 1990-91, before injury forced him out of the tournament.

He was selected two years later in Victoria's under-19 side, helping the state claim title honours over New South Wales taking 6-154 at an average of 25.66. Williams went on to make his senior state debut, bursting onto the first-class scene for Victoria in 1994-95 with effect.

While seemingly always on the verge of national selection, injuries continued to be the thorn in his side. After the death of his father, Williams relocated to Western Australia for the 1999-2000 season in search of a fresh start and another crack at realising his potential and fulfilling his ambition to play international cricket.

"The key to rising above any setback is to never lose sight of your dream. Life is full of struggles but you just have to push those aside and get on with achieving your main goal," he said.

"I had a taste of first-class cricket and a dream to play for Australia. That's always been my goal. I told that to my Dad before he passed away and it keeps inspiring me to aim for that, no matter what gets in my way."

The move to Western Australia paid dividends for Williams, amassing an impressive list of cricket accolades: an Australian Test call up against South Africa in December 2001 (eventually selected as 12th man), a one-day international debut against New Zealand at the MCG in January this year (a match in which he fractured his thumb while batting), securing an ACB contract for the current season and, most recently, achieving success with Australia A.

While his rise to the international stage has not been without its challenges, Williams' persistence has earned him a

reputation as a dynamic fast-bowler who captures wickets and terrorises batsman with his sheer pace and accuracy.

His battles against adversity stand him in good stead to provide advice to young cricketers forging their own career at this year's championship, a tournament which launched his career a decade ago.

"The under-19 championship was a terrific experience for me. It was an experience I'll never forget and which gave me the grounding to build my career.

"It's important to keep the expectations and pressure on yourself to perform at the under-19 championship realistic. Relax, enjoy the atmosphere, play your own game and the results will follow.

"Take it from me, you just never know what's around the corner if you stick to your dream and never give up."

New South Wales won all of its preliminary round matches in progressing to the final, where it eventually defeated Queensland by 22 runs in a gripping contest at Newcastle's No.1 Sports Ground.

New South Wales was 5-82 before contributions from Brad Roworth (37) and Daniel Christian (68) helped the side to 242 early on the second day. Queensland progressed to 2-93 thanks to opener Aaron Maynard (42) and Greg Moller (35) before a collapse saw the side slump to 8-155.

Opening bowler Scott Brant loomed as the unlikely hero for Queensland with the bat making 49 from 61 balls before falling as the last wicket, handing New South Wales the title.

Victorian wicket-keeper Adam Crosthwaite was named Player of the Championship after his polished display behind the stumps (nine catches and a stumping) and outstanding efforts with the bat. Crosthwaite was the leading run-scorer for the championship with 296 runs at an average of 74.00, including a highest score of 99 in the final match against South Australia.

Wrist spinners Beau Casson (Western Australia) and Ryan Leloux (Northern Territory) were the leading wicket-takers of the championship (18 wickets each) while New South Wales batsman Jason Krejza made the highest individual score - an unbeaten 200 in the semi-final against South Australia.

Solid performances by Scott Brant (QLD), George Bailey (TAS), Xavier Doherty (TAS) and Shaun Marsh (WA) resulted in them being offered state contracts for the 2002-03 season. A number of other players were offered state rookie contracts for the 2002-03 season, including Aaron Bird (NSW), Jarrad Burke (NSW), Robert Cassell (VIC), Beau Casson (WA), Mark Cosgrove (SA), Ben Hilfenhaus (TAS), Andrew James (WA), Jason Krejza (NSW), Tim Paine (TAS), Craig Philipson (QLD) and Craig Simmons (WA).

Umpires Andrew Craig (WA) and John Ward (VIC), who officiated in last year's championship final, were offered state rookie contracts for the 2002-03 season along with fellow championship umpires John Booth (SA), Tim Laycock (QLD), Ken McGinniss (TAS) and Shane Reed (NSW).

The 2001-02 Commonwealth Bank Championship Series played more than a development role in Australian elite youth cricket last year. It provided the platform from which to select the Australian under-19 team that contested the 2002 ICC Under-19 Cricket World Cup in New Zealand.

At the end of the under-19 championship, the following players were selected to represent Australia at the World Cup:

Cameron White (VIC), George Bailey (TAS), Aaron Bird (NSW), Jarrad Burke (NSW), Robert Cassell (VIC), Beau Casson (WA), Daniel Christian (NSW), Mark Cosgrove (SA), Adam Crosthwaite (VIC), Xavier Doherty (TAS), Adam Fleming (NSW), Shaun Marsh (WA), Craig Philipson (QLD) and Craig Simmons (WA).

After Australia's disappointing fourth-placing at the 2000 Under-19 World Cup, the Australian Cricket Board (ACB) dedicated increased resources and funding to the development of its young elite cricketers in preparation for the World Cup.

The squad undertook thorough training and groundwork in the lead up to the event, giving themselves every opportunity to improve Australia's record at the world's premier competition.

The preparation paid dividends as the Australians went undefeated through the tournament, claiming a seven-wicket victory over South Africa in the final at Lincoln's Bert Sutcliffe Oval.

The win was Australia's first since the inaugural (unofficial) under-19 World Cup in 1988 and marked a significant occasion with both the Australian senior and under-19 teams holding the coveted trophy at the same time.

Australia's strength was its all-round power. Tasmanian Xavier Doherty's slow left-arm spinners claimed 16 victims, the competition's best, while Aaron Bird (15) and Beau Casson (12) also featured in the top eight wicket-takers of the tournament.

Australian under-19 captain Cameron White was the tournament's leading run-scorer with 423 runs. And with Craig Simmons (399 runs), Shaun Marsh (317), George Bailey (256) and Jarrad Burke (249) all scoring heavily, Australia was rarely short of runs.

The team was coached by former Australian wicket-keeper batsman Wayne Phillips and managed by ACB Director Brian Freedman.

The 2004 ICC Under-19 Cricket World Cup will be held in Bangladesh during January and February 2004, Players born on or after 1 September 1984 are eligible for selection in the Australian under-19 team for this event.

The Australian under-19 championship was established by the Australian Schools' Cricket Council (ASCC) in 1969-70.

Previously, the ASCC had run an under-16 competition until, with the introduction of overseas tours by underage Australian teams, it became apparent that a change in age groups was required.

The ASCC commenced international touring in 1966-67 (India), undertaking further tours to New Zealand (1967-68) and South Africa and Zimbabwe in 1967-68. They experienced difficulties selecting truly underage representatives and so the decision was made to run an Australian under-19 carnival and select a team from those boys competing.

Overseas tours continued to Fiji and West Indies (1969-70), Sri Lanka (1971-72) and Pakistan in 1980-81.

New Zealand were invited to compete in the championships and did so as an equal entity from 1970-71 until 1983-84. The carnival was held in New Zealand in 1977-78. Northern Territory did not join until 1984-85.

In 1981-82, the Australian Cricket Board (ACB) assumed the running of the carnival to make the championship truly representative of Australian under-19 cricketers. The ACB felt that under the jurisdiction of the ASCC, the championship was open just to schoolboys and not to other players of the same age who had either left school or were studying under another system.

Under the ACB's administration, players competing in the championships are selected by each state and territory cricket association from either club or school competitions.

This season's Commonwealth Bank Under-19 Championship Series showcases some of the nation's best young male cricketers

In competing in this national event, the players have taken a step along the Australian cricket pathway. The next steps will lead them to senior grade cricket representation, first-class cricket and possibly Australian selection.

This pathway is essential in guiding Australia's next generation of talented cricketers to the top, where they will hopefully help the nation maintain its status as one of the world's best cricket countries

The Australian Cricket Board's (ACB) Game Development department looks after the Australian cricket pathway. The department is responsible for overseeing cricket development activity from the game's grassroots for male and female participants.

Over the past 12 months, ACB Game Development has made significant inroads into harnessing mass interest and talent across the country.

The department has four key units:

- Community Cricket:
- Education and Training;
- · High Performance Cricket; and
- · Women's Cricket.

Together, these units form a national cricket system that attempts to uphold the spirit of cricket, increase participation, and coordinate world-leading elite performance programs.

High Performance Cricket

The Commonwealth Bank Under-19 Championship Series falls under the High Performance Cricket unit, as does the Commonwealth Bank Cricket Academy, national second XI competitions and all underage championships for male and female cricketers.

ACB Centre of Excellence

High Performance Cricket's most significant current undertaking is the establishment of an ACB Centre of Excellence. Over the next three years, the ACB will develop a multi-faceted cricket institution that will build on the unrivalled success of the Commonwealth Bank Cricket Academy.

The Centre of Excellence will see a base established not just for players, but for coaches, umpires, curators and administrators. The ACB's sophisticated sports science and medicine programs will also be incorporated in the Centre of Excellence, along with an information resource centre that will compile a range of cricket intelligence in one location.

The ACB has not yet committed to a location for the Centre of Excellence. Submissions from proponents are still being received, with a decision on the location expected in mid-2003.

Cricket development in Australia's capital

Cricket development does not just take place in a national capacity. Tireless work is carried out at local levels by state/territory cricket associations.

The Australian Capital Territory Cricket Association (ACTCA) plays a significant role as the chief provider of quality cricket programs in the ACT and regional Southern New South Wales.

In recent times, the ACTCA has established a number of objectives geared toward increasing cricket participation and raising the standard of programs offered to promising players.



In attempting to reach these objectives, initiatives have been established in areas such as coach education and competition structure. A number of programs for young males and females, as well as Indigenous communities have also been established.

The success of the ACTCA development system has seen a number of talented cricketers rise through the ranks to international representation, such as prolific limited-over batsman Michael Bevan, talented New South Wales wicket-keeper Brad Haddin and new Southern Redbacks all-rounder Mark Higgs.



Plaving conditions for the Commonwealth Bank Under-19 Championship Series are contained in the 2002-03 ACB Playing Conditions handbook. Some of the information contained in the Playing Conditions is outlined below.

Nomination and eligibility of players

Players competing for New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia, Tasmania, Victoria or Western Australia are to be under the age of 19 on 1 September 2002. Players competing for the Australian Capital Territory or the Northern Territory are to be under the age of 20 on 1 September 2002. A team shall consist of 12 players but only 11 are allowed to field. The interchange of fieldsmen without restriction is permitted. providing no plaving time is lost. One player in each team shall not be permitted to bat. In the event of a team batting twice, the player not permitted to bat may alternate from the first and second innings.

The break between spells is to be a minimum of 60 minutes (including the lunch and tea breaks). A bowler who has bowled a spell of less than 6 overs (under 17) or 8 overs (uner-19) may resume bowling prior to the completion of the necessary break as defined above but this will be considered an extension of the same spell and the limit of 6 or 8 overs in total for a spell will still apply. Following the completion of the spell, the normal break between spells will apply - the break within the spell is disregarded. Over age players from the ACT and NT shall abide by the bowling over limits prescribed for players uner-19 years of age. Coaches, captains, umpires and players shall cooperate to ensure the over limits are adhered to.



Sir Donald Bradman Stand Function Room Manuka Oval Manuka 7:30pm for 8:00pm Players and officials participating in or involved with the Commonwealth Bank Under-19 Championship Series must comply in all respects with the ACB Code of Behaviour, the ACB Racial and Religious Vilification Code and the ACB Anti-Doping Policy.

Copies of these documents are made available to players and officials participating in or involved with the Commonwealth Bank Under-19 Championship Series prior to the commencement of the event. Any player or official who has not been provided with a copy should contact the ACB. While the ACB endeavours to ensure that copies are available to all relevant persons, it is the individual responsibility of players and officials to ensure that they have read and fully understand the contents of the codes and policies. If these policies are contravened, players and officials may be subject to stringent penalties, including fines and suspension.

A brief description of each document is set out below.

1. ACB Code of Behaviour

Cricket is a game that owes much of its unique appeal to the fact that it is played not only within its Laws, but also within the spirit of the game. Any action seen as abusing this spirit causes injury to the game itself.

Embracing the spirit of the game means participating, either as a player or as an official, fairly and exhibiting respect for other players and officials and the game's traditional values such as graciousness in defeat and humility in victory.

Cricket has a distinct place in Australian society and history. As an element in Australia's national identity, cricket plays a significant role. This status brings with it particular responsibilities for players and officials to conform to high standards of fair play and personal behaviour on and off the field. The ACB Code of Behaviour is intended to protect and enshrine such important qualities and standards so that all may continue to enjoy the game of cricket now and in the future.

The ACB Code of Behaviour applies to the following persons:

- a) players who are employed, engaged or appointed by the ACB or a state association or who are otherwise members of any team selected by or playing under the auspices of the ACB or a state or territory association; and
- b) officials (including coaches, managers, umpires, doctors and other persons acting in an official capacity in relation to a team) who are employed, engaged or appointed in connection with any team or match played under the auspices of the ACB or a state or territory association.
 The Code applies to behaviour both on and off the field of play.

The Code applies to all players and officials participating in or involved with the Commonwealth Bank Under-19 Championship Series.

2. ACB Racial & Religious Vilification Code

The purpose of this Code is to:

 a) recognise the commitment of the ACB and state associations to the elimination of racial and religious vilification of players; and

b) establish a framework for handling complaints made by players who believe they have been subjected to racial or religious vilification by another player.

Under the Code, a player who is participating in a match under the auspices of the ACB must not engage in any

conduct, act towards or speak to any other player in a manner which offends, insults, humiliates, intimidates, threatens, disparages or vilifies the other player on the basis of that player's race, religion, colour, descent or national or ethnic origin.

The Code applies to all players participating in or involved with the Commonwealth Bank Under-19 Championship Series.

3. ACB Anti-Doping Policy

The ACB condemns the use of performance enhancing drugs and doping practices in sport. The use of performance enhancing drugs and doping practices is contrary to the ethics of sport and potentially harmful to the health of athletes.

The ACB aims to prevent the use of performance enhancing drugs and doping practices in cricket by:

a) imposing effective sanctions on persons who commit doping offences;

- a) educating and informing persons about drugs in sport issues; and
- a) supporting the drug testing programs and education initiatives of the Australian Sports Drug Agency (ASDA) and other recognized drug testing authorities.

All players, coaches, managers, umpires, doctors and other persons acting in an official capacity in connection with the Commonwealth Bank Under-19 Championship Series may be subject to investigation and disciplined under this Policy.
